Shaheen Announced That A Project To Build A New Bridge Over The Connecticut River Between Hinsdale And Brattleboro Received \$12 Million In Federal Funding. "A long-awaited project to build a new bridge over the Connecticut River between Hinsdale and Brattleboro will receive a \$12 million federal grant, according to a news release from U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen's office Wednesday. Fellow New Hampshire Democrats U.S. Rep. Annie Kuster and U.S. Sen. Maggie Hassan were also involved in securing the funding. The new bridge will replace the old red-listed double truss bridges that flank Hinsdale Island and carry Route 119 over the river. According to the N.H. Department of Transportation, the total cost of the project will be \$40 million, split between federal funds and the states of Vermont and New Hampshire. N.H. DOT estimates construction will begin next August, and for the new bridge to be open for traffic in 2023. A Shaheen spokesman confirmed the newly announced funding will keep the project timeline on track for 2023." [Keene Sentinel, [11/6/19](#)]

Shaheen Announced That A New I-89 Bridge Project Crossing The Connecticut River Received \$10 Million In Federal Funding. "U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen, D-N.H., says an Interstate 89 bridge project that crosses the Connecticut River into Vermont is getting \$10 million in federal funding. Shaheen, a Democrat, said Tuesday the funds would rehabilitate bridges that carry northbound and southbound traffic between Lebanon, New Hampshire, and Hartford, Vermont. A report on the project says its primary purpose is to correct structural deficiencies and improve safety between the Interstate 91 interchange in Vermont and the Exit 20 interchange in New Hampshire. The project proposes to widen the existing bridges. The bridges were built in 1966. The money is coming from the Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery program." The City Of Concord Signed A Key Document To Replace Sewalls Falls Bridge After Efforts By Shaheen Helped To Expedite The Process. “Concord officials have cleared a stumbling block in plans to replace the Sewalls Falls Bridge. A key document signed by state and city officials this week allows the city to move forward and design a new bridge. [...] City officials had expressed concern this summer that a federal historical review process was taking longer than expected and would delay construction. Engineers also determined that the one-lane bridge over the Merrimack River was deteriorating and only safe for passenger vehicles. Ambulances stopped traveling over the bridge when its weight limit was reduced to 3 tons in August, increasing emergency response times to East Concord. [...] While the city waited, U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen and U.S. Rep. Annie Kuster sought to expedite the process. Shaheen and Kuster wrote a letter to U.S. Secretary of Transportation Anthony Foxx in July, requesting quick action by the federal government. The joint announcement was made by U.S. Sens. Jeanne Shaheen and Maggie Hassan and Reps. Chris Pappas and Annie Kuster. The Pease Development Authority has committed to making a roughly \$19 million investment to expand and upgrade the terminal at Portsmouth International Airport as the airport continues to see increases in passenger flight service. A \$1.6 million grant will go to Pease Development Authority to expand the terminal building to 67,000 square feet, enabling more efficient movement of passengers and luggage. U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen, D-N.H., said she’s pleased to see this substantial federal investment in the state’s airports, which she said are critical to New Hampshire’s economy. ‘These federal grants will extend and rehabilitate taxiways, remove runway obstructions, expand terminals and provide overall infrastructure investments that will serve Granite Staters on the Seacoast and in Manchester, Laconia and Concord,

[...] The project includes room for private security screenings, escalators and a concession area where people can buy food, beer, wine or a cocktail. Brean said a new 10,000-square-foot hold space with a New Hampshire lodge feel is the main way the airport is upgrading the building for people who use the airport to fly from Portsmouth to Florida, Georgia and South Carolina. Brean said the airport will get an additional passenger jet bridge and gate as part of the project so it can accommodate two aircraft at the same time.
